

Brady almost became the only rider to win a world crown in their first season of SGP. Beau went on to win the Victorian Solo Title at Mildura, capping off a brilliant start to his season.

Darcy Ward appears to be on track with his Boxing Day night meeting at Eastern Creek, to bring back solo speedway to Sydney with a world class field. Fingers crossed that it all goes well for him.

Kurri has run some speedway practice days and hopefully this will get them keen enough to run some speedway promotions this summer season.

I have been kept busy for a while with couple of engines from Mark Collins. One being an 891 Jawa engine, which is a double overhead cam 2 valve engine, made for Long Track and Ice Racing in the '70s. Most people would not have heard of one of these, let alone seen one. 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SECRETARY REPORT John Walker



From a personal point of view, it's been a very complicated three months since my last "Secretary's Report", involving moving house and settling into a new community, contracting a repeat and very painful dose of sciatica, and trying to help keep the business of the ASRA moving on. Because of the timing of our move, the Q4 Newsletter had to be printed before my wife and I left Sanctuary Point and posted to members when we moved into Tura Beach. The move and the back trouble meant that I couldn't attend the November Committee Meeting, but Terry and I, with some help from my daughter, made the Team Video conference gear work, and the meeting was productive.

Some key issues addressed included:

- The meeting welcomed Chantelle Adams and approved her appointment as Social Media Manager. Chantelle highlighted social media opportunities to attract younger members and grow membership.
- We welcomed State Youth Ambassadors for NSW (Chris Streep), VIC (Mark Jones) and SA (Aaron Summers). Yet to confirm YAs for QLD, WA and Tasmania.
- Newsletter - Q4 member feedback – again overwhelmingly favourable. After consideration of the costs of printing and postage the committee agreed on the need to raise membership fees [see next page] and attract more sponsor advertisers to offset costs. Reminder 2026 Q1 copy date November 30th.
- Membership - we currently have 198 paid-up members, up from 186 in August, and 384 members on the FB site, up +112 from August. Our website is averaging around 60 hits per week following the release of the Q4 Newsletter.
- ASRA's various efforts to help junior speedway in Queensland and NSW, including the recent highly successful Nepean Come and Try, helped by Darcy Ward's support of Speedway Experience.
- The Committee agreed to explore a possible reunion event at Maitland in 2026.
- Awards – the Committee agreed that Brady Kurtz was the natural choice for Most Improved 2025 Solo Rider award and discussed the Ranking System that I have been developing and outlined below.

My ranking system, just like the world tennis rankings, is based on Aussie riders' actual results in all major competitions - SGP1 rounds, SGP2 rounds and the SGP3, averages from speedway leagues in the U.K., Poland, Sweden and Denmark and, from next year, results from Australian and State 125/250/U21/Open Championship meetings.

This means that ALL Aussie solo riders, whether racing at U16, U21 or Open levels, in Australia or overseas (or both) will be given a ranking based on actual performance. Comparing next year's rankings with this year's, ASRA can choose to present awards at each of these levels, e.g. most improved Open rider, 250cc rider, U16. U21 and so on.

While the highest rankings will logically go to those at the SGP level, the most IMPROVED could go to riders at any level. For example, in the process of developing the rankings system, (albeit these early versions were based mostly on Australian and State titles results), I was able to compare 2018/19 and 2019/20 rankings.

The overall most improved in 2019/20 would have been Victorian Open riders, Patrick Hamilton and Jamie Crundwell, who each jumped over 50 places in the overall ranking. But not far behind in the "most improved" list were 250cc riders Dane Walsh (Qld) and Lachlan Hayes (NSW). Most improved 125cc rider was Michael Cogdell (Vic), who jumped 18 places.

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

Talking to Darcy about the problems facing Queensland junior speedway and speedway in general following the closure of Mick Doohan Raceway on December 15th after the North Brisbane Cup on Dec 6th.

What's your intelligence on NBMCC status? 'As far as I'm aware the club has not found anywhere to relocate to. Apparently there were some rumours about a possible joint venture with Ipswich but to be honest I very much doubt this will ever happen....there would be no real benefit to the Ipswich club'

Is there any progress at Moreton Motorsport Park? 'I've spoken with the owner, Andrew Corbett. The reality is that they would love to have the bikes there but they don't have council approval right now, that's what the whole sports waiting on. He is all focused on cars and building a motorsport precinct but if that can include bikes due to the council approval then they will do it...that's pretty positive'.

Have you heard anymore about Russell Carswell South Burnett venture? 'I know as much as you... I see everything else on Facebook about everything but that venue. I've not seen any photo updates, I've not heard where they are at. It seems all talk at the minute. A little disappointing not to have any updates'

What options do juniors have in Queensland? 'I'd hate to be a junior in Queensland. Kingaroy are doing everything they can but they're very limited. I haven't heard about Ipswich. I've not seen a practice day there in a couple of months. It would be a golden opportunity for Ipswich with the closure of North Brisbane''.

How do you explain low 250 rider numbers? 'The 250 boom happened three or four years ago and they have all moved up to 500's. So there's a dull spot for 250's right now because four years ago there was nowhere for 125's to ride, only Boyces Speedway Experience and my days in Brisbane. We look like we're going through a bit of a 125 period at the moment with OK numbers, a full field in the Victorian title and I had ten entries for the Queensland title.'

How was the North Queensland Title meeting at Pioneer Park? 'A successful meeting for me, great for everyone involved, riders and spectators. It was stressful trying to get the numbers to be honest. The track was OK, not to my high standards but OK. We had two crashes with Josh and Tate, probably the two main drawcards. Josh broke his thumb and it's still pretty swollen.'

How was your first Cowra event? 'I can't thank the Steve Kurtz and the Cowra club for giving me the opportunity. We were lucky to run after heavy afternoon rain. The track just drank the water and soaked into the base. We had to adjust and drag dirt off after each round. After four rounds we were down to base and it was too rough to safely race. Given the weather we were lucky to put on a show for around 200 diehard spectators. Cowra just wanted to try it and be as successful as it could be and we'll do it again'

How is Eastern Creek progressing? 'It's all work in progress as the track has not been touched in seven years!. All mistakes and hurdles come with challenges. We have new dirt coming in next week and sprinkler parts for the water truck. We will keep testing every week, learning and improving each session up to Boxing Day and beyond. It's a new NSW venue and could host an Australian title round.'

MEET THE NEW STATE YOUTH AMBASSADORS

The following appointments have been made to date ;

NSW Youth Ambassador Chris Steep from Wilberforce.

'My name is Chris Steep, my background in speedway extends over many years, my Dad Rob Steep was involved with Speedway Sidecars from the early 70's helping the likes of Doug Robson, Geoff Grocott, Warren Sullivan etc.

I was 16 when got my start in speedway it was in a F500 powered by a Jawa 897 at the Newcastle Motordrome, I then went on to drive Speedcars starting off for the Wells team in the famous #54 car which most people will remember from the Sydney Showground era with Sid Middlemas at the wheel. I have an engineering background and enjoy doing speedway bike builds and restorations in my spare time, I currently race modern and classic sliders in dirt track / longtrack events as well as solos at the Speedway Experience days, my son Cohen is 9 he also rides and enjoys both dirt track and speedway event.

Brought up around bikes with my dad. Riding trials in my younger days. We used to go watch speedway at North Arm. I had a PW50 and the point came as to whether it was MX or speedway and I chose to go with a speedway at the age of six I think. Went through to 16 years old, winning the Aussie Championship in the last year of my juniors. My dream was to race in Europe but wanted a back up career behind me. So I completed an apprenticeship then left straight away for the UK, starting my career in at Edinburgh and Buxton before moving around to several other clubs such as Coventry and Swindon, winning leagues and several other trophies. I finished my last year in the UK with Oxford and Ipswich before moving myself and family back to Adelaide where I now enjoy helping out and passing on the knowledge I know to others.

WIZARDS OF OZ

ANYONE hardy enough to brave the bitter cold at Torun's Marian Rose Motoarena will have witnessed a number of speedway miracles last week.

Just 24 hours after Germany won its first world team championship at any level in FIM Speedway of Nations – SoN2, Australian duo Brady Kurtz and Jack Holder delivered a generational performance for the country's second SoN gold medal in three years.

It all threatened to go horribly wrong when hosts Poland thumped them 7-2 in their opening heat – a statement victory that gave Patryk Dudek and Bartosz Zmarzlik a great opportunity to end the country's wait for gold in a competition that very much plays second fiddle to the Speedway World Cup in the hearts and minds of Polish fans.

But the Aussies parted the white-and-red sea with an astonishing opening lap in the Grand Final that allowed Kurtz to turn any SGP tears into champagne as he bounced back from falling just a point short of Zmarzlik in the race for individual gold by bringing the SoN trophy back Down Under.

Chief among Kurtz's growing repertoire of miracles is his ability to not just walk on water, but race on it too. The clouds opened in Torun ahead of tapes up and it rained on and off throughout the meeting. But having developed fins since moving to Manchester, rain is simply manna from

heaven for Kurtz, who is rapidly becoming speedway's master of racing in the wet.

He couldn't have ended his 2025 season with a richly-deserved World Championship gold medal without the heroics of Holder. If Kurtz is the magician of this team, Sheffield's Holder brings the muscle and tenacity.

Despite a great start by European and Polish Champion Dudek in the Grand Final, Holder battered his way ruthlessly, fairly and quite brilliantly around the kerb and up the inside of one of the sport's inform riders. He was a first-bend bulldog all night and his determination facilitated what came next.

Kurtz took to the dirt and quickly blazed around Dudek, but he had the spectre of Zmarzlik lurking on the inside line with intent, ready to slice his way through the Aussie pack if he could.

Refusing to be denied again, Kurtz grabbed a handful of throttle on turn three, hit the hyperspace button and thundered around the six-time world No. 1 for a lead the Roos never relinquished.

Holder even had time to look into the elated eyes of 2012 World Champion brother Chris as he powered down the Torun back straight on his way to a third world title in all competitions for one of the sport's greatest-ever sibling duos.

Wild celebrations ensued as an army of Aussies jumped the fence to embrace their heroes, and if they ride like this in Warsaw on August 29, 2026, they might

make it a double. PGE Narodowy hosts the World Cup Final next summer and SoN victory for Australia means they have already qualified alongside hosts Poland.

Another miracle produced by Mark Lemon's men was ending the Grand Final curse for the country that tops the score chart after 21 heats. Since the competition was launched in 2018, the leaders after 21 races – or 42 when the Final was decided over two days – have never carried off the trophy when the title race has gone the distance.

Britain missed out in 2018 and 2022, Poland slipped up in 2019 and 2021 and Holder and Kurtz experienced similar agony when Great Britain's Dan Bewley blazed past them in Manchester last season to join Robert Lambert at the front.

Six straight 7-2s ensured that result wasn't repeated. Things were not looking great after Dudek and Zmarzlik left them trailing in Heat 2. But a tweak of the set-up later and the Aussies were quickly in the race for gold.

Danish duo Michael Jepsen Jensen and Leon Madsen were dispatched in Heat 6. Sweden's Fredrik Lindgren got between Kurtz and Holder in Heat 9 but the world No. 5 slammed his way through on the back straight on lap two, rattling Lindgren against the safety fence as he joined his colleague from Cowra at the front. Not many people do that to Lindgren but when there's national pride on the line,

The Latvians were left trailing in Heat 14, before a quirk of the draw handed Australia a menacing position for the final block of races – they had two outings in the final four heats while everyone else had only one.

Poland and Denmark were their main rivals but had to make do with places in the Grand Final Qualifier. The Poles may have pumped up the volume in Torun by beating the Aussies in their opener. But they had to make do with a 5-4 win over Sweden in race five, which saw Lindgren get away while Jacob Thorsell admirably took the fight to Dudek for the third.

After a 7-2 against the Czech Republic in Heat 8, Lambert took points off the Poles when he finished second in a re-run race 13. It could have been more as Dan Bewley battled Zmarzlik for second, while Lambert hit the front in the first staging. But the Cumbrian slipped off after an epic tussle going into lap two, turn four. An awkward crash ended Bewley's night and GB's hopes of retaining their crown.

After 7-2-ing Latvia in Heat 17, the Poles

- Gates 1 and 3 produced 14 heat advantages in 23 races: nine maximum 7-2s, two 6-3s and three 5-4s.
- Gates 2 and 4 saw six maximum 7-2s, one 6-3 and two 5-4s.
- SoN champions Australia's six maximum wins were equally split, three from gates 1 and 3 and the same from 2 and 4. The only race in which they didn't finish first and second was their opening 7-2 loss to Poland in Heat 2, when they started from 2 and 4.
- Other maximums: Poland (3), Denmark (3), Sweden (2) and GB (1).
- Latvia's only advantage was their 5-4 against the Czechs, the only country not to beat any of its six rivals, in Heat 4.
- Although gate 3 produced the most wins, gate 1 amassed 13+2 more points. Czechs Milik (Heat 1) and Bednar (Heat 8) had the only two pointless rides from the inside.
- Gate 4 yielded only one second place and four lasts in five races between heats 16 and 20 inclusive. The outside grid also provided the most lasts or non-finishers, including Bewley's Heat 13 exclusion.

came up against Denmark in the teams' final heat. After opening their night with a maximum victory over Great Britain, the Danes suffered a reverse of that against the Aussies, before winning three of their four remaining races 6-3, with a 7-2 against Czech Republic thrown in.

The Poles went into their final heat on 32 points, with Denmark chasing on 28. Despite Madsen taking the win ahead of Dudek and Jepsen Jensen relegating Zmarzlik to the back, Poland had done enough to at least earn first choice of gates for the Final Qualifier – maybe even direct passage to the Final.

The Aussies raced to a maximum against the Czech team in Heat 18 but still had one last heat up their sleeve – a battle with the Brits in race 21.

With Bewley sidelined, Lions' No. 3 Tom Brennan stepped up. He had already collected a third place ahead of Swedish star Thorsell, following home second-placed Lambert for a GB 5-4 win in race 16.

The Lions picked up heat advantages in three of their six races on their way to fifth place overall, but they couldn't live with the Aussies this year, Kurtz and Holder slamming in a 7-2 to send them straight through to the Grand Final.

The only downside to the knockout-style finish to SoN meetings, which sees all the marbles on the line over two huge races, is if a rider is excluded for any reason, the contest is all but over.

This happened in the Grand Final Qualifier, which saw Madsen and Dudek clash going into a tight third turn on the opening lap. Some will suggest the Dane wiped the Pole out, while others may opine that Torun's finest leaned in, waited for the impact and hit the deck. Ukrainian referee Aleksandr Latosinski went with the former viewpoint and ejected Madsen from the re-run.

All Jepsen Jensen could do at this point was fight his way to the front and pray for a Polish mechanical mishap. He did just that with a sensational opening lap in the re-start but Zmarzlik and Dudek cruised home for a 5-4 to set up a Grand Final showdown with Australia.

It was a miserable end to their least favourite international tournament as the Polish seniors came up short against Australia – 24 hours after their junior compatriots missed out on the Team Under-21 World Championship podium for only the second time in the competition's 20-year history.

Victory belonged to Australia, and it was absolutely deserved. After dropping just six points across two events and falling just one short of maximum points in Semi-Final 2, Kurtz and Holder are very much the sport's best pair.

Their journey to the top started two decades ago as kids on the Australian youth scene, and those who dubbed them the next Chris Holder and Darcy Ward were clearly on to something. Add Jason Doyle and Max Fricke into the mix, and this is now the team to beat in world speedway.

Given that Holder, Doyle and Fricke are all former Warsaw winners and Kurtz finished second there last year, it may take more than 50,000 Poles to roar their side to SWC gold at PGE Narodowy next summer.

Brady Kurtz

AUSSIE ace Brady Kurtz feared he had blown his final chance of an FIM Speedway gold medal in 2025, before he blazed to Speedway of Nations glory in Torun on Saturday.

He said: "I actually thought it was all

over when the tapes went up. I didn't make the best start at all. But I squeezed in there somehow. I got to the outside. I knew I had to get to the fence.

"Sure enough, when the straight came, Jack was in front, looking over his shoulder and waiting for me to come past. Once we hit the front, I was checking the big screen every lap and we were solid all race. We were so good all night together. Once we hit the front, I was pretty confident that we could get it done, and I am really happy with this one.

"It was definitely one I wanted. I would

have liked another one to go with it but this one will definitely do. It has been a hell of a year. Finishing off with this has really made it special.

"I'm relieved. I was a little bit nervous before the meeting. It's a big deal to represent your country. I tried not to let the boys down and I'm glad we didn't.

"Jack was so solid all night. He made every start, looked for me and gave me the run through. It's a real honour to put this suit on.

"We knew the first heat was going to be tough. We had gates two and four early on and we didn't know what the track was going to be like. We made some changes and got it working. I knew me and Jack could be solid for the rest of the meeting. I knew if we got seven points in heat 21, we would be on."

Belle Vue's Kurtz enhanced his growing reputation as a master of wet conditions.

"It was just how I like it," Kurtz smiled. "Throw anything at us! The track had been funny all week. Torun has been really difficult all year in the league. They changed it a little bit last week, which made it even more difficult.

"You didn't always know what was going to happen. Something different was happening with every track grade but we made it work in the end and that's what matters."

His partnership with Holder has been forged over two decades of competing alongside and against each other from youth level all the way to SGP and the SoN. Kurtz was elated to share one of the biggest moments of his career so far with a childhood friend and rival.

"It's definitely a full-circle moment, I guess you could say. Jack and I have done more races together than anyone in the history of speedway probably. We have

done team events together since we were nine, 10 or 11. Finally, we got it done on the big stage.

"I've done my last match and now I can turn the brain off for a minute. I found it tough last week to keep the focus that I've had for the last few months. I managed to find one last bit of magic to pull it together and now I'm really looking forward to a good off-season."

AUSSIE skipper Jack Holder added to his victory alongside Max Fricke at Vojens in 2022 by dominating last Saturday's Final with world No. 2 Brady Kurtz.

The world No. 5's tenacity to fight his way under Dudek on bend one in the Grand Final saw him link up with the high-riding Kurtz, who swept majestically around Bartosz Zmarzlik to join Holder on a 7-2.

"It was all happening!" Holder said. "I knew I needed to watch my back and that first corner was pretty tight. I just held on, pushed and shoved, showed some Aussie grit, looked for BK and there he was - Mr Rocket Man!

"I just kept looking up at the big screen to see where the Poles were and rode it home. Once I saw we were one and two, we just kept doing what we were doing and then, on the last lap, we had a cheeky

look over the shoulder and saw they were pretty far back. We knew we had it all sewn up.

"It was not the best conditions. We had rain and the track was covered when we walked it. We could only walk half of it.

"We had Poland in the first race and didn't really know what to do with the track or the bikes. It's not that we went the

wrong way; we just started a little too high on the sprockets. After that, we just went back to what we had on the Wednesday and that's it.

"We are there doing a job for our team. I don't care if Brady wins all of the races and I get second, or vice-versa. That's our biggest thing in Team Australia. When it comes to team events, we are very chilled and work together as a team very well. It's not all about personal success. As long as we are standing on the right step at the end, I don't care who wins."

Holder hopes to take his success in the team events into SGP next year. While he won this year's round in Warsaw and finished fifth overall, he would love to take the next step and mount a title challenge.

"The GPs are another level and it's all about mindset. I know I can do it. It's very frustrating if things aren't going your way. You just need to be chilled out but it's a big thing - you want that gold medal at the end of the year. I know I can do it. It's all learning and you never stop learning. My time will come."

As Holder stormed to glory in the Grand Final, he even had time to give 2012 World Champion brother Chris Holder a look of joy as he powered down the back straight. That fleeting moment underlined the huge pride one of speedway's greatest-ever

sibling duos has in each other's success, as Chris jumped atop the fence to celebrate after the race.

"We are a long way from home, and we are blood," Jack said. "If he's racing, I'm there, and if I'm racing, he's here. No questions asked - we are family. We are taking on the world."

ERNIE SUES

BULIMBA MOTORCYCLES. BRISBANE. QLD.

Erie Sues was a popular rider in Brisbane and Ipswich . in the 1960's, he was also well known for his mechanical abilities. At his Brisbane motorcycle shop he employed John Titman, together they produced the Dirtrax frame to meet the shortage of frames in Brisbane. Based on the Rotrax frame, the early models had the Rotrax type rear end, the later models had the curved Jawa type rear end.


The author met Ernie in Cairns in May 2009, when Ernie revealed several details about his work and the machines he built. Identification was by way of a number system pre fixed by the letters GT or SP , the date of manufacture was pre fixed with the numbers 00 hence 01/002/001/001966 would indicate model number 1, built 2/1/1966. A total 74 frames were made for speedway and 33 for grass track.. Some frames had optional location holes for the bottom stay this gave an option of reducing the wheel base for more drive. Ernie hand beat his own tanks and pressed his own seat bases. As demand grew he imported complete Jawas to obtain the engines and countershafts, so they could offer a complete machine.

John Titman rode a Dirtrax when he won the 1978 Queensland title. Kevin Torpie set up a World track record on a Dirtrax at the EKKA speedway in Brisbane.

A little known fact is that Ernie pioneered the double sided rear hub, he recalls being frustrated when John had 6 rear wheels at a meeting to give a new edge for each ride, Ernie returned to the workshop and produced the first double sided hub.

Apart from frame building Ernie was, and still is a sought after engine tuner. Visting World stars Michael Lee and the late Simon Wigg were so impressed with Ernies skills they both wanted him to go back to UK with them.


Now in his 75 th year Ernie still potters in his workshop on his cane farm south of Cairns and loves to talk speedway. He was a great friend of Cairns legend, Rusty Rees, who encouraged Ernie to get back in the saddle in his later years

Gillman Championship 23/11/2025

In the Sidecar section of the Gillman Championships held on 23rd November 2025, Justin Plaisted/Brian Anthony were unbeaten in the heats and led for three laps in the final only to be beaten by Trent Headland/Jaxon Rayner.

Plaisted was riding a bike borrowed from Mick Farrell and clung to the inside line all day and in the final Headland attempted to get through on the inside for a couple of laps but then, with a powerful burst of speed, roared around the outside of at the end of the third lap and into the last lap for a narrow victory.

Despite being a former Australian champion the win was Headland's first in his local track championship.

Kiwis Taylor Green/Callum Innes, who stayed over for the postponement despite a lot of extra cost and MA paperwork, finished third and Josh Pascoe/Dale Knights were fourth.

Pascoe/Knight's fourth place continued their fine form from the previous weekend when they won the inaugural Spotty Burke Memorial at Broken hill, and they were direct qualifiers for the final on countback after beating Green/Innes in heat 8 which was the Kiwis first defeat at Gillman after seven straight wins over the opening two meetings.

Highlights amongst the non-qualifiers for the final, were the form of Nate Headland/Harry Hearne and Byron Mordaunt/Jarrad Katzorke. Headland was making his first sidecar appearance at Gillman since breaking both legs 21 months ago (after making his first comeback rides at Broken Hill the previous weekend) and was quickly on the pace, scoring 9 points and finishing second to Green in the semi-final. Mordaunt was much better than his 7 points would indicate, and was even the early leader against Plaisted and Trent Headland in heat three. Mordaunt's brother Jason, in his first season, also rode well and was a lot better than his lowly two points would suggest.

Over his British career, Douglas has ridden for the Scunthorpe Scorpions (2013–17, 2023), Wolverhampton Wolves (2019, 2021, 2023), Leicester Lions (2019, 2021, 2024–25). In that time, he has collected numerous team honours: the Championship title and Shield with Leicester in 2019, the Championship Knock Out Cup with Scunthorpe in 2023, and the Premiership Knock Out Cup with Leicester in 2025.

BEAU BAILEY REJECTS ENGLAND

New South Wales based rising star Beau Bailey has turned down a stellar opportunity to compete in the UK in 2026 and instead will follow the modern trend of focusing on Poland as his primary league destination. The sixteen year old has quickly asserted himself as the most exciting Australian prospect since Darcy Ward and whilst he was touted as a key signing for the mega successful Poole Pirates in 2026 – that won't happen.

Speaking from his base in Grenfell NSW, Beau's Father, Tim, explained the situation. "We were grateful and flattered by the interest shown in Beau by the UK clubs and whilst we are relatively new to speedway, we are aware that the UK has been enormous in developing Australian talent over many years," he said.

"However, with Beau being so young we are very mindful of the logistics involved with riding on a fixed night in the UK and we just don't think he's old enough to handle the rigors of that sort of schedule, if he is based on the continent."

"He will race in Poland and Denmark at this stage and obviously his primary goal over time will be to get involved in the SGP series – but that is a long way away."

"In saying that, we would imagine that at some stage racing in the UK will happen, we most certainly haven't ruled it out, but at the moment it just doesn't make sense," he concluded. Bailey's decision may also be attributed to the rapid decline in the number of UK clubs still operating and the inability of the UK hierarchy to give any real clarity around how many leagues will operate in 2026 and how many clubs will be involved, He is certainly 'The one that got away' as far as UK speedway goes.

Losing races is the best way to learn and whilst it is not enjoyable it gives you motivation. I was never a good rider, but I was always available and keen to race – I didn't know any other way. Some of these Aussie blokes riding in the UK with four and five point averages who think they need a break are getting bad advice. Racing in Australia will give you memories and stories that will last a lifetime. Take it from me – winning the League, The Knock Out Cup or the Four Team Tournament final means nothing outside the UK. Australia is where you build your reputation. Think about it.

TAYLA TERRIFIC I had the pleasure of meeting young Victorian lady racer Tayla Street at Cowra recently and what a lovely person she is. It's a huge undertaking to wrestle a 500cc speedway bike around a rain effected Woodstock Raceway, but Tayla did it with control and poise – it was great to see. She absolutely loves the sport and I'm sure she will continue to improve. Good stuff.

VETERAN TIMELINE

Ken Le Breton

Francis James Le Breton (15 August 1924 Sydney,^[1] New South Wales – 6 January 1951)^[2] was an Australian Motorcycle speedway rider who was nicknamed "The White Ghost" due to his wearing white leathers.^[3]

Biography

Le Breton served in the Australian Army as a gunner in World War II.^[4] His service in New Guinea ended when he was hospitalized with swamp fever (malaria) and battle fatigue.^[4] He was discharged in 1945 and took up speedway the following year.^[4] He took part in novice trials at the Sydney Sports Ground but failed to impress and was turned away. He then took part in trials at the West Maitland Showground in New South Wales and was immediately noticed by everyone as he appeared with all white leathers and bike. Ray Duggan, who was at the meeting, took an interest in Le Breton and helped him get established back at the Sydney Sports Ground where he rode in all white as "The White Ghost".

Le Breton sailed to the United Kingdom in 1947 to try to get a team place and signed for the New Cross Rangers.^[5] Things did not go so well so the second-division Newcastle Diamonds signed him in exchange for Jeff Lloyd and £1000. He moved with the Newcastle promotion to Glasgow with the Ashfield Giants in 1949 for two seasons until 1950.^[6]

Death

Le Breton was involved in a crash on 5 January 1951 at the Sydney Sports Ground, where he first rode a speedway bike. He was representing Australia in the second Test match of the 1950–51 season against England.^[4] In heat 18, he was attempting to pass England's Eddie Rigg on the last bend, looking to gain third place, when he cut into Rigg's rear wheel. Le Breton's bike locked and he hit the safety fence hard and straight on. He died the next day in St Vincent's Hospital in Sydney due to severe injuries including a fractured skull^[4] and punctured lung.^[4]

Flying the flag for the vanquished were Jack Morrison (11 from 5) with Sam Martin (8 from 5) the only other Rest Of Australia rider to score more than 4 points.

Mildura – Promoting international speedway again.

As has become customary in the last several years Mildura are again hosting international riders who make the long trek to tackle the Olympic Park circuit at the biggest Mildura meetings outside the national championship round. This years invitees include seven times British champion and SGP rider Scott Nicholls, former British Under 21 champion 22 year old Leon Flint, current British Under 19 champion 18 year old Luke Harrison, and 26 year old American Luke Becker. The above quartet will be racing in the Phil Crump Classic on 27th Dec and the Jason Lyons Trophy on 17th Jan 2026



Undera & Myrtleford Update.

Both Undera and Myrtleford are still plugging away in their respective battles to bring permanent speedway back to each of the towns. Myrtleford celebrated a landmark date in welcoming back bikes on Sat 29th November, only a practice day for dirt track bikes as the track is not yet fully accredited to run speedway, but it must have been a welcome sight seeing bikes back on track for the first time in something like 20 years. Undera is still in the process of making the necessary improvements required (brighter track lights, moving the pit gates, and updating the control tower) in order to also become accredited to run speedway again. Unfortunately they are experiencing the never ending problem of available funds to carry out improvements being less than the cost of items on their wish list. I know the club would appreciate it if anyone who has a few \$'s to spare might like to become a financial member of the club.

SSRAV at Broadford 2026 club race dates. At the time of writing the SSRAV club are still awaiting confirmation of club race dates for 2026. It's a drawn out process, first Broadford have to decide what major championships that the complex will be holding and those dates are blocked for other tracks at the complex, then Broadford decide which will be the noise free weekends (one per month), and then available remaining dates are circulated to the clubs that use Broadford. Clubs then apply for what dates they would like.



A BIT OF SPEEDWAY AND MUSICAL HISTORY – Bill Powell

A bit of history of Redcliffe Showground Speedway in Queensland. The track was always stated as being around 700 yards. Some programs had it listed as a third of a mile. A newspaper article in June 1929 revealed that the Redcliffe Motor and Cycle Club approached the Trustees of Redcliffe Showground for the formation of a speedway, stating that the grounds were ideal for that purpose. Redcliffe is a coastal town situated approximately 28km north of Brisbane. Sadly, the history of Redcliffe Showground Speedway has somewhat been forgotten. The following information has been provided, thanks to the help of a number of Speedway researchers, historians and former competitors.

The speedway ran 'on and off' irregularly and for short durations for much of its history. Redcliffe speedway re-opened on 10th August 1959 with Peninsula Speedway Pty Ltd being the promoting company, of which Bill Goode was one of the Directors. Bill went on to become a Queensland Speedcar Champion and speedway track promoter.

The meetings were a combination of Solo, Sidecar, Stock Bikes, Speedcar, Stockcar and TQs. Bike competitors of note were, Kev Torpie, solos and stock bikes, John Finglas, stock bikes, Ron Johnson, Sandy McCrae, and Alan Chance on sidecars. Kev and Pat Torpie, Bill Honeyman, Les Bentzen and Alan Meires were local boys who were popular riders with the spectators. Some Highlights being:

in May 1982 Five Star Speedway Promotions Interstate Sidecar Clash between QLD and NSW. Six members were in each team. Queensland was captained by the QLD Champion Keith Sewell. Doug Tyerman captained NSW. Phil McCurtayne recalls riding that night. He liked the track, big and fast with a good surface. He remembers that the lighting wasn't that good and the crowd were allowed to get very close to the fence. The final result was a win to NSW 75 points QLD 31.

In 1986 Clive Featherby Jnr, along with Queensland international solo rider Alan Rivett (*having rode for seven British speedway clubs from 1984 to 1990*), was instrumental in bringing international speedway to Redcliffe Showground for an unofficial Australia vs England Super Test. This Test Match brought a crowd of 14,750 to the grounds. England was well led by maximum man Kenny Carter and Simon Wigg, winning the test 66 to 42. John Titman was an outstanding performer for Australia. Not too far distant from Redcliffe Showground was the trotting facility Redcliffe Paceway. This was where Ivan Mauger held the 2002/03 Australian Long Track GP. The winner of that event being Mick Poole. The proposed 2003/04, 2004/05 titles at the Paceway were cancelled.

Redcliffe Speedway received worldwide recognition for the important role it played in the discovery of one of the world's most successful singing groups, the Bee Gees. Redcliffe Speedway became the birthplace of the Bee Gees.

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A BIT OF SPEEDWAY AND MUSICAL HISTORY – Bill Powell

This is how it happened -

In 1959 Brisbane based speedcar driver Bill Goode was the promoter of Redcliffe Speedway. He recalls: *"one of the drivers, Bob McMahon, came to me and said there are three young kids outside wanting to sing at the interval for a coin drop. Being harassed as I was and over busy, I was looking for something to fill in at interval so I said yeah sure. Interval time came and I heard these harmonious voices coming over the cheap old four-inch Tannoy speakers that were in the pits. It just stopped me in my tracks."*


The brothers began to entertain the crowds at the speedway, performing from the back of a truck owned by local fruiterer Duke Bowman during interval. This was the first public appearance by the trio. At the time Barry Gibb was 12 years old and twin brothers Robin and Maurice were 9 years old. The crowd clearly loved the group. The Gibbs made 10 quid that night from money thrown onto the track - a whopping sum to take home to Mum. The boys may have had a degree of motorcycling and speed in their blood, having been born in Douglas on the Isle of Man, home of the world-famous motorcycle TT. Stock bike racer John Finglas remembers three kids with a guitar coming into the pits and asking *"Hello mister, can we sing for you."* Barry Gibb later stated *"The smell of the oil and the noise and atmosphere were incredible."*

They sang through a PA system and people threw money on to the track. Their performances were so impressive that Speedway Promoter Bill Goode introduced them to leading Brisbane 4BH radio DJ Bill Gates, who then hired the brothers to sing their songs on the Brisbane Radio Platter Chatter Show. Barry Gibb, Bill Goode and Bill Gates all had the initials BG and so it was Bill Gates who suggested they call themselves the BGs. They were unaware that the boys' Mother Barbara Gibb was another BG. What is very interesting reading, in an interview with English Speedway Star journalist Peter Oakes in December 2020, Bill Goode spoke about the process he and Bill Gates took to promote the brothers.

Stock bike competitor John Finglas commenced his racing career in 1953 racing a Shesley Limited Matchless, fitted with a high performance Shesley Walsh competition motor. (see photo) this bike was originally owned and raced by Kevin Torpie. John later purchased it and repainted it in his red and white colours. John was a regular and successful competitor at Redcliffe.

Graham Gardiner has visited the Redcliffe Historical Society located at the Redcliffe Library. The very helpful librarian indicated that their archives have a vast collection of archival information regarding the history of Redcliffe Speedway.

THE LATE KEVIN TORPIE

It is with deep sadness and regret that I have to inform you of the sad passing of long time VSRA/ASRA Member Kevin Torpie, aged 87 years. Kevin passed away on Wednesday 1st October 2025 at a Care Facility in Queensland. He unfortunately had been suffering ill health for some time and now he is at peace.

During his ASRA Membership Kevin was always willing to help out with various club activities and in his retirement years still had a keen interest in speedway. With wife Chris, son John he was a regular attendee to VSRA/ASRA Reunion functions. Kevin also attended QLD speedway meetings and displays, until illness curtailed this activity. A lifelong motorcyclist, he enjoyed touring on his registered road bike. Often travelling from his home in QLD to attend the Phillip Island Motorcycle GP, in Victoria.

For all those who knew Kevin would describe him as the perfect gentleman, extremely modest, quietly spoken, and an unassuming speedway rider. A popular well respected competitor. A dedicated Speedway man with a professional approach to the sport. Undoubtedly recognised as one of Australia's most knowledgeable exponents of the speedway art.

Kevin has had a very impressive speedway career.

Starting his speedway career on stock bikes at Redcliffe showground QLD in the 1959/60 season. He became a regular in the solo ranks at the Ekka & Archerfield before travelling to Victoria to compete at the Fred Tracey's Marybynong speedway.

He travelled to England in 1962, signing for the

Middlesbrough Bears under Reg Fearman, who would become a lifelong friend. In 1964 he was transferred to Edinburgh. Representing his country in tests 14 times from 1967-73 his 15-point score at the Ekka in 1973 was his highpoint. On the individual stakes, Victorian Solo Champion in 1967. Queensland Solo Champion 1969. Kevin was an Australian Solo Championship finalist 5 times between 1967 & 1974.

In June 1967 he moved to Rockhampton for an extended racing campaign on North Queensland circuits. Kev was a member of "Cowboy" Bob Sharpe's Troupe which put on some of the most spectacular and hard fought solo racing ever seen in Queensland. Sharpe's Troupe, bolstered by regular visits from Brisbane "A" graders, gave spectators a standard of racing rarely equaled anywhere in Australia.

Kevin retired in 1973, but when his work took him to North Queensland in 1974 he had a short twilight season at Townsville and Cairns.

Kevin Torpie was a champion not only as a rider but as a human being.

He will be sadly missed yet happily remembered.

Deepest sympathy is extended to Chris, John and his many friends at this sad time.

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
